
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
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

M.Y.LERMONTOV IJODIDA IDIOSTILISTIK XUSUSIYATLAR OʻRTASIDAGI MUNOSABATLAR DINAMIKASI: TEMPORALLIK ROLI VA EVOLUTSIYASINI TEKSHIRISH

Annotatsiya. Pushkin crafts a linear narrative that, while rich in temporal markers, adheres to a traditional temporal flow. Lermontov, conversely, exhibits a more fluid and fragmented approach to temporality in works like "A Hero of our time". Lermontov's narrative structure, characterized by its non-linear progression and episodic nature, reflects a more complex engagement with temporality, offering a fragmented view of the protagonist's life that challenges the reader to piece together the temporal sequence, thereby engaging more deeply with the existential themes of the narrative.

The comparison with Nikolai Gogol, another contemporary of Lermontov, highlights different aspects of temporal innovation. Gogol's work, particularly in stories like "The Overcoat", demonstrates an interest in the cyclical and mundane aspects of time, focusing on the repetitive nature of human existence. Lermontov's treatment of time, by contrast, often transcends the immediate and tangible, delving into the existential and philosophical implications of temporality. Through characters like Pechorin, Lermontov explores the subjective experience of time, using temporal shifts and fragmentation to reflect on the nature of existence and the individual's place within the temporal continuum.

When viewed against the backdrop of the broader Romantic movement, Lermontov's temporal handling can be seen as both a continuation and a departure. Like many Romantics, Lermontov imbues his landscapes and narratives with a sense of timeless, often using nature as a mirror for the human soul's eternal aspects. However, Lermontov diverges from this tradition through his emphasis on the psychological and existential dimensions of temporality. Unlike the predominantly linear and historicized time of earlier Romantics, Lermontov's work displays a keen interest in the fragmented and subjective nature of time, aligning him more closely with the later existential and modernist preoccupations.

Through this comparative lens, it becomes evident that Lermontov's idiostylistic approach to temporality marked a significant innovation in the literary treatment of time. His exploration of non-linear narratives, subjective temporal experiences, and the existential implications of time distinguished his work from his contemporaries and predecessors. Lermontov's narrative techniques—such as the use of flashbacks, fragmented storytelling, and the integration of existential reflections—contributed to a more nuanced and complex understanding of temporality in literature.

Lermontov's treatment of time within his literary works stands out for its complexity, depth, and innovation. By comparing his approach to those of contemporaries like Pushkin and Gogol, as well as situating him within the Romantic tradition, we can appreciate the distinctiveness of Lermontov's temporal handling. His work not only reflects the idiostylistic uniqueness of his literary voice but also his contribution to the evolving narrative of temporality in 19th-century Russian literature and beyond.

Conclusion. In conclusion, this study has demonstrated the intricate ways in which temporal dimensions are interwoven with the idiostylistic expressions of Mikhail Yuryevich Lermontov, offering a unique insight into the complex relationship between time and narrative structure. Lermontov's masterful manipulation of temporal elements not only deepens the thematic richness of his works but also highlights the existential explorations central to his literary output. By dissecting the nuanced temporal landscape across his narratives and poetry, we have illuminated how Lermontov's idiostylistic choices underscore the profound impact of temporality on character development, thematic exploration, and reader engagement. This exploration contributes significantly to our understanding of 19th-century Russian literature and the broader discourse on time in literature, affirming Lermontov's enduring legacy as a pivotal figure whose work transcends the boundaries of time and continues to resonate with contemporary audiences. Through the lens of idiostylistics, Lermontov's oeuvre emerges as a testament to the power of temporal dynamics to shape narrative meaning, enriching our appreciation of literature's capacity to capture the essence of human experience across the temporal spectrum.

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
