

Graphical stylistics is crucial in written communication, and its three main components are alphabet, graphics, and orthography. Different writing systems, including Latin, Arabic, and Cyrillic scripts, influence phonographic stylistic choices in various languages.

In literary texts, phonographic stylistic devices enhance an author's artistic strategy. Renowned English writers such as L.Frank Baum, Lewis Carroll, A.A. Milne, Dr.Seuss, and Roald Dahl frequently used phonographic elements in their works.

Linguist L.I.Yeremina highlights the broad scope of graphical stylistic devices and their importance in literary discourse. Unconventional letter arrangements, excessive



punctuation use, and innovative typographical choices contribute to an author's stylistic richness.

In Uzbek linguistics, G.Yakhshiyeva has extensively researched phonographic stylistic devices. She defines phonographic stylistics as a field studying the stylistic potential of pronunciation and graphic elements in written language. These devices enhance emotional and expressive depth and contribute to text structure and punctuation use.
