The relationship between linguistic and speech personality is also studied by Prof. L.P. Klobukova. In her opinion, the concept of linguistic personality in general is characterized by an insufficient categorical apparatus, and she insists on developing the term based on the concept of speech personality. We believe that in this understanding, any linguistic personality represents a multi-level and multi-component paradigm of speech personalities. In other words, a single linguistic personality can be realized in many speech personalities.

In the aspect of linguoculturology, other options for the content of linguistic personality are presented. So, according to the point of view of prof. V.A. Maslova, linguistic personality is a multi-layered and multi-component paradigm of speech personalities. At the same time, a speech personality is a linguistic personality in the paradigm of real communication, in activity.

Awareness of the linguistic personality from the position of linguoculturology turns out to be promising, since the emphasis is on a collective cultural and historical image, which involves studying the peculiarities of the mentality of a linguistic society and the characteristics of the national culture. In line with this direction, the triad language - man culture is formed and used, i.e. the inextricability of the connection between language, culture and ethnic group (people) is affirmed.
