Vinogradov analyzed the phrases from a scientific point of view. The scientist identified the activity of the phraseological units in the oral speech, the object and the structure of the phraseology and proved it in science.

The term "phraseology" was also founded by Russian linguists who lived in the late 1940s and 1960s, and today the term "phraseology" applies not only to the phraseological units but also to the section that studies them. A number of scientific works, articles and works by I.P. Smith, A.V. Kunin, B.A. Larin, I. Postashenkov and others present interesting facts and evidence on the origin and sources of phraseological units. Only at the beginning of the 20th century, Phraseology was introduced as an independent branch of linguistics. In the process, J. Seide, Ch. Bally, I.I. Srezniewski, E.D. Polivanov, L.V. Scherba, A.V. Kunin, W.V. The role of such scholars as Vinogradov and B.A. Laren played a significant role. The famous Linguist A.V. Kunin created the English-Russian phraseological dictionary and based on many of the phrases and their theories. The scientist was also called the father of phraseology. N.N. Amosova, a similar linguistic scholar, based on common sources of phraseology, E.F. Arsenyeva and Grenville comparisons of different phraseological sources of different languages [5].

At the same time, not far behind his contemporaries, Lowie explored the link between phraseology and the mentality of national cultural peoples. Glaser R was the first in this list to describe the methodological abilities of phraseological units and was a scientist who studied the features and levels of Gran Libras in both oral and written English. One or another phraseology emerges at certain times and reflects the way of life of that time. The complexity of phraseology as a language unit requires the clarification of images that are characteristic of phrases.

2. **English Literature** (e.g., the green-eyed monster - jealousy) (W. Shakespeare).
3. **Religious Rituals and Legends** (superstitions and legends) e.g., a black sheep - a less successful or more immoral person in a family or in a group. People believed that a black sheep was marked by the devil.
4. **Historical facts, events and individuals** (such as historical facts and events) personalities e.g. to do a Thatcher - to stay in power as prime minister for three consecutive terms.
5. **Daily life, changing facts** (facts and facts of everyday life), for example, to carry coals to Newcastle - to take a with to a place where there is plenty of it available. Newcastle is a city in Northern England where a lot of coal was produced.
6. The major sources of borrowed resources are based on:
 1. **Written sources** (the Holy Script) e.g., the kiss of Judas - any display of affection whose purpose is to conceal any act of treachery.
 2. **Historical legends and myths** of different peoples and cultures (for example, to cut the Gordian knot to deal with a difficult problem in a strong, simple and effective way).
 3. **Facts and events in world history** e.g., to meet one's Waterloo - face to face, esp. after previous success, a final defeat, a challenge or an obstacle one cannot overcome (from the defeat of Napoleon at Waterloo in 1815).
 4. English language variants; for example, a hole card - a secret advantage that is ready to use when you need it (American).
 5. Other languages (classical and modern) e.g., the fair sex - women, from French le beau sex; let the cat out of the bag - reveal a secret carelessly or by mistake, from German die Katze aus dem Sack lassen.

The phraseological expressions in the writings of the famous English writer Alexander Pop have not only increased the artistic level of these works but have also become some of the expressions used by the people in oral speech. These include:

Fools rush in where angels fear to tread - fools rush to places where the angels fear to step. The phrase comes from the author's essay "An essay on criticism" and has become the most commonly used phrase in modern English. In addition, the phrase ***Damn with faint praise*** (from Epistle to Dr. Arbuthnot) means to criticize and is well-known. The following are some examples of phrases in the writings of Walter Scott and Jeffrey Chaucer, as they help us get a closer look at English literature: ***To catch smb. red-handed*** - to capture anyone in crime; ***Beard the lion in his den*** - to attack a dangerous enemy in his own space (from Ivanhoe); ***On one's native path*** - at home, in one's own country; ***A foeman worthy of smb's steel*** is a worthy competitor, the opposite (from "Rob Roy").

Through thick and thin - notwithstanding any obstacles; ***Murder will out*** - all secrets are revealed; ***He needs a long spoon that sups with the devil***; ***If you fall in love with the devil, you are better off***; ***If you sit at the table with the devil, get a long spoon.*** ("The Canterbury tales")

Examples of phrases such as the historical events in the life of the British people and the factors associated with their distant past are "Gretna Green (Scottish) marriage - teenage marriage, the Gretna Green border between England and Scotland, a small village in the middle. In Scotland until 1969, teenagers were allowed to marry. Generally, young lovers have fled there to marry. This is the history of the phrase ". Another example is "custom of Kent - evenly distributing something. According to the custom of Kent County, the land was divided equally between brothers, unless there was a testament after his father's death.
